

Sand Dollars

Sand dollars are not actually white when alive, are related to sea stars and sea urchins, use spines to eat, have a "jaw" with five teeth-like sections, can be aged by counting growth rings on their exoskeleton, often live in large groups, can't survive long out of water, and

their underside looks quite different from their beautiful top surface with many spines and a mouth for feeding.

Key points about sand dollars:

Appearance when alive: Unlike the bleached white color you see on the beach, live sand dollars are usually purple or brown.

Family ties: Sand dollars are closely related to sea stars and sea urchins.

Feeding mechanism: They use tiny spines to capture food particles like plankton and algae.

Mouth structure: Inside a sand dollar is a jaw with five sections of small teeth used for grinding food. Sometimes a sand dollar "chews" its food for 15 minutes before swallowing. It can take two days for the food to be digested. Scientists can age a sand dollar by counting the growth rings on the plates of the exoskeleton. Sand dollars usually live six to 10 years.

Aging process: Scientists can age a sand dollar by counting the growth rings on the plates of the exoskeleton. Sand dollars usually live six to 10 years.

Social behavior: Sand dollars often live in large groups, sometimes with hundreds in a small area.

Fragility out of water: If you find a live sand dollar, be sure to return it to the water as they cannot survive long out of the ocean.

Underside appearance: Unlike the smooth top, the underside of a sand dollar has a complex structure with a mouth, anus, and many spines.

Danager – Sand dollars do not bite.

However, their long spines can cause puncture wounds and their small bones in their spines can cause a burning sensation if they puncture the skin. Be careful when handling the underside of a sand dollar.

What is the trick to finding sand dollars? To increase your odds of finding a sand dollar, scour the shallow waters of a beach during low tide. Sift through seaweed or shell piles. Venture into the dunes to look for buried and long-forgotten dollars. Keep searching and you just might find that lucky sand dollar!

What does the sand dollar mean spiritually? -- What is Sand Dollar Symbolism? For many, sand dollars represent the beauty and power of the ocean, reminding us of our connection to the natural world and the wonders it holds. Others see sand dollars as a symbol of personal growth and transformation, representing the potential for spiritual enlightenment and renewal.

In what states is it illegal to take a live sand dollar? The fine is \$500 for taking live sea creatures from South Carolina beaches. Florida and Georgia also have similar laws, and some are left up to local municipalities.

Did you know that these humble echinoderms have been stirring the imagination for centuries? There's a particularly lovely Christian legend about sand dollars representing the story of Christ's birth and resurrection.

If you've ever noticed the star-shaped pattern on the top of a sand dollar, the legend tells us that it represents the Star of Bethlehem, guiding the wise men to baby Jesus.

And when you flip the sand dollar over, there's an outline of a poinsettia, the Christmas flower. Inside, if you carefully break a sand dollar, you'll find five tiny white 'doves' – these are said to symbolize peace and the joy that spread when Christ rose from the dead.

Isn't it amazing how such a small creature can hold such deep and symbolic stories? Whether or not you connect with these tales religiously, they certainly add another layer of wonder to the humble sand dollar.

Remember the next time you come across a sand dollar, it's more than a pretty keepsake; it's a symbol of the profound beauty and complexity of the world around us.




The Royal Merchant — Sill unlocated

The Royal Merchant was a 17th-century

English merchant ship that sank in 1641 while carrying a



The repairs, however, failed to resolve the Merchant Royal's problems: As storms rolled in, leaks overtook the ship, and the pumps failed to work. The vessel sank 34 miles from Land's End, laden with gold and jewels.

Many have searched for it but the wreck has yet to be located. Whoever finds it will have access to some \$1.25 billion in treasure.

In 1786, this ship dropped off 800 slaves in the Caribbean and left with what Allen generally calls "a whole lot of gold coins" — before it met its fate by running into a reef and sinking.

Texas tycoon Carl Allen has invested millions into treasure hunting — and has his eye on some 280,000 coins said to be stranded on a sunken slave ship. Allen and his crew found four of the coins — just enough to tease the promise of more.

"They salvaged 100,000 coins out of 380,000. That leaves 280,000 coins to be found," Allen told The Post. "We're looking at it right now."
